# They've been a constant throughout the decades and they're very much a

### part of Interplast's bright future.

Integrally involved in the establishment of Interplast in 1983 with the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, Interplast is supported by Rotarians in clubs and districts throughout Australia and New Zealand. A central thread throughout the organisation, Rotarians are equal members of the Company, have equal representation on the Board of Directors and form the Rotarian Committee, which advises the Executive and Board on Rotary matters.

Since 1983, Rotarians have raised significant funds to support Interplast in repairing bodies and rebuilding lives. Over 85 Rotarians have accompanied teams as observers and have returned to act as ambassadors of Interplast by spreading our word, voicing their experiences and sharing our secret.

Anulagi is a three-year-old boy who lives with his family in Apia, Samoa.

An Interplast surgical team recently visited Apia and operated on 46 patients in collaboration with local partner Tupua Tamasese Meaole Hospital. Interplast has worked in Samoa since our inception in 1983 and we run training and surgical visits each year to the island country.

Interplast volunteer surgeon Damian Marucci explained that Anulagi was born with a unilateral cleft lip.

A cleft lip is a gap in the upper lip. If it is on one side it is a unilateral cleft lip, if on both sides, bilateral. To repair the cleft lip, the plastic and reconstructive surgeon makes an incision on each side of the cleft lip to the nostril. The two sides of the lip are then stitched together by rearranging the surrounding tissue. In addition to closing the lip, the repair includes realigning the muscle of the upper lip to provide normal lip function and facilitate sucking.

Anulagi is a bright young boy and full of energy, but his cleft lip was starting to affect his speech and he was becoming aware of his difference to other children.







Before the surgery both Anulagi and his mother were understandably nervous. Associate Professor Marucci was able to comfort them using the words of Samoan that he has learnt over the years of Interplast programs.

Associate Professor Marucci repaired the cleft lip alongside the local surgical registrar Dr Junior Posini. Anulagi's surgery was a resounding success and his mother is incredibly happy with the surgery result. She is happy that Anulagi will now be able to have a similar future to his friends and siblings.

This surgical program was supported by the Rotary Club of Mornington and the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons through the Pacific Island Program.


## How can you help?

Ken has generously offered to free agist 30 of that farmer's calves on his property at Kangaroo Valley, but they will require feeding.


Through a suggestion of David Edmondstone, we have decided to coordinate a community funding scheme to purchase the required silage to feed the calves. Ken has estimated the calves will go through one and half silage bales a week. That is 6 bales per month at around \$150 each.

The aim of this project is to provide immediate and direct support and relief to the victims of the recent bush fires in and around the Armidale Local Government Area. The primary victims of these devastating and destructive fires are farmers who have significantly suffered loss and emotional trauma. There has also been loss of life due to the catastrophic nature of the fires and unpredictable nature of the event which unfolded. Many have lost homes or incurred serious damage to their properties. The Rotary Club of Armidale AM is working closely with Debby Maddox, the Rural Financial Counselling Officer for NSW Northern Region who has over 1,000 rural and regional families in need who are seeking assistance due to their trauma and lack of support services.
